WHAT IS THIS COURSE ABOUT?

CGS 0092 University Seminar provides new and/or transfer students with the skills necessary to maximize their potential for academic success at the University of Pittsburgh. During this course students will be exposed to various University resources; explore educational and career planning; gain academic confidence; and will become familiar with and utilize cognitive science-based skills and competencies necessary for college success.

Course Prerequisites

This course has no prerequisites.

WHAT WILL YOU ACCOMPLISH?

Upon successful completion of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Develop and apply effective study habits and skills to maximize your academic success.
- Identify and articulate personal academic and career goals that align with your skills, values and interests and continue to explore interest and abilities with confidence and purpose.
- 3. Identify and access campus and student resources critical to your college success.
- 4. Explain the value of academic integrity and follow academic standards, policies, and procedures.
- 5. Develop a network and community of support.

WHAT COURSE MATERIALS WILL YOU NEED?

We will use open educational resources (OER) in this class. Textbook readings and materials can be accessed through our Canvas Course site.

COURSE FORMAT

University Seminar is an online hybrid course offered through Canvas. The course combines web-based asynchronous with synchronous instruction and promotes active learning through technology, open educational resources, exploration, self- reflection, and group discussions.

An Important Note About Online Classes

Online courses are very convenient for students because they provide additional flexibility in learning. However, students should not think that an online course is an excuse for neglect of academic responsibility. Please be prepared to conscientiously work and give this course the attention it deserves. I recommend that you log in on Mondays and then several times throughout the week, review the announcements area for updates and note any assignments due that week. I will use the class report function in Canvas to review student activity in the course shell.

Since this is a seminar-based class, our work this term will include elements common to seminars such as journals, collaborative projects, weekly readings and activities, and participation in class discussions. COURSE REQUIREMENTS



Attendance & Participation (30%)

Class participation and engagement are an important component of this course and are measured through a set of activities such as your attendance and participation in four virtual synchronous workshop and contributions to discussion prompts.

Virtual Workshops

Our class meets virtually on four Mondays: 1/10, 2/7, 3/14, and 4/25. On those dates, we will meet at 5pm on Zoom

(you can access the Zoom link for each meeting from within our Canvas course site). Those meetings will last 50 minutes. You are required to **attend all four workshops.**

Discussion Prompts

You are expected to actively participate in asynchronous class discussions throughout the semester. Discussion topics will be based on the content assigned for reading and journal writing in given weeks. You will create an initial post and respond to at least one classmate. Detailed instructions and an e-netiquette are provided in the Start Here module in Canvas.

PITT Onboarding Modules (15%)

Pitt University Offices and Centers offer various onboarding / orientation modules in Canvas to help new students prepare for their first semester and academic studies at Pitt. As part of this course, you will be required to complete: The Student Online Toolkit (focus: technology); the Study Lab module (focus: active study skills and strategies), and Hillman Library's Academic Integrity Module (focus: academic honesty and critical inquiry). The submission of these assignments is graded as Complete/Incomplete.

Online Self-Assessments & Consultations (20%)

Over the course of the semester, you will complete several free self-assessment skills and personality inventories as part of your textbook readings. You will be asked to **submit the results for only two of them**: LASSI and YouScience. Access to these two inventories is provided by Pitt's Study Lab and The Career Center. You will also set up a meeting with an academic coach and a career counselor to debrief your results and discuss actions if necessary. Detailed instructions are provided in the Assignments area in Canvas. The submission of these assignments is graded as Complete/Incomplete.

E-Portfolio (35%)

You will use the questions provided in each week's readings and discussions to reflect on the content covered in class and relate this knowledge to the experiences you engage in during your first semester at Pitt (classwork, campus events, workshops, extra-curricular activities, studying, etc.). You will set up an E-Portfolio in Canvas

and create a page for each of the weeks a journal reflection is due. On select weeks, you will be asked to choose and share for class discussion an excerpt from your journal entry and offer comments, feedback, and ideas to the postings of your classmates (See *Discussion Prompts*). Further instructions for your E-Portfolio are provided in the Start Here module in Canvas.

UNIVERSITY AND COURSE POLICIES

Technology Requirement

This course is offered completely online through the Internet using Canvas. As such, you must have reliable access to a computer with a high-speed internet connection. Please note: Because this course involves the use of computers on an advanced network system, there may be periodic problems associated with technology. If, at any time an event occurs that you believe reflects a problem with the system, contact me immediately. We will do everything we can to correct any true errors and to work out a fair solution. However, please be aware that we are experienced in the operation of this technology and are able to track in detail your access to the system by time and date as well as the length of time that you were logged in. Please do not make statements which are patently dishonest about the dates and times you have attempted to take examinations or your failure to use prudent judgment in executing your responsibilities for completing this course successfully. Students who delay doing their assignments until the 11th hour will receive no sympathy from this instructor. Assignments will close on the time/date posted on this syllabus, after which they will no longer be available.

Late /Incomplete Work and Free Passes

All assignment due dates are given on the course schedule. Please mark your calendar accordingly. In the event of a true emergency (accident, family emergency, severe illness) that prevents you from attending the class for an extended period of time, I will make accommodations with legitimate student documentation. Please be aware that make-up assignments may differ in both content and format. Should there be any changes to the schedule, I will notify you in advance. My advice to you is not to wait until the last day to start an assignment, as doing so you will run the risk of falling behind in this class. However, I do recognize that sometimes life gets in the way and things happen. See the next section on free passes to learn more about how you can request a deadline extension or resubmit an assignment. But please note, if you do find yourself falling behind or are having difficulty with the material, please, email me, or make an appointment to meet virtually or chat on the phone prior to the due date. I want you to succeed and I am here to help!

Free Passes

Each student will receive 4 free passes at the beginning of the semester.

❖ 1 free pass = a 24-hour grace period to submit an assignment that has a firm due date (Note: discussion class prompts and virtual workshops are excluded).

Example: You could use 2 free passes to turn an assignment in 48 hours late with no penalty. But you need to claim your free passe(s) within 24 hours of the date the assignment was due. An email to me would suffice.

You can also use free passes to revise and resubmit an assignment (2 free passes per revision). Your grade will be based on the revision you submit. Note that you will only have 48 hours to submit your revision before the free

passes expire. Remember: You can't use free passes after the last day of class, virtual workshops, or assigned discussion board prompts.

After the 4 free passes are used up, assignments will receive a 1 point per calendar day reduction for each day late after the due date.

G Grades

The "G" grade is applied only when students who have been attending a course and making regular progress are prevented from completing the course by circumstances beyond their control, such as a major medical emergency. If you do not receive an email response from me within 24 hours it means that I never received your email or I responded and, for some reason, you never received the response - please resend your email. If you are emailing me because you are having trouble with an assignment, please do not wait until the last minute to ask for help.
